Talk and tour of City Archives

For our September meeting we will be having a tour of the Wellington City Council Archives.

City Archives is a treasure trove of information documenting the history and development of Wellington. Primarily holding records of the Wellington City Council and its predecessor organisations (including Karori Borough Council), the Archives also hold the records of the Union Steamship Company on behalf of Museum Wellington, as well as a small collection of community archives.

Our evening will consist of a talk by the president outlining the work Archives does, and the information the collection holds and how it can be accessed and used to help with your research. There will then be a tour of the premises, as well as a chance to browse and see some collection items specifically relating to Karori.

The Archives are located at 28 Barker Street, which is off Cambridge Terrace by the Basin Reserve. There should be on-street parking in Barker Street at this time.

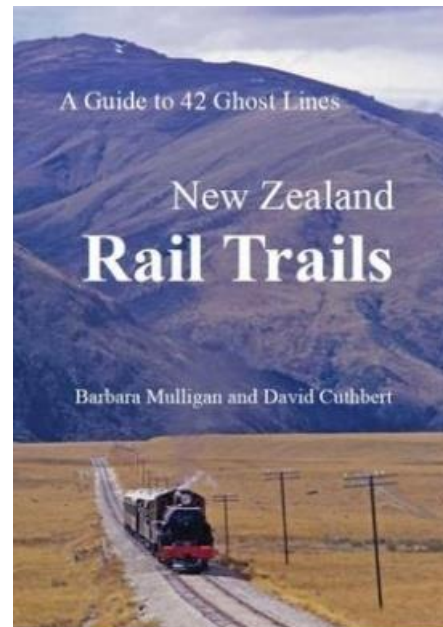

The speakers covered both a history of the growth then decline of the rail network, as well as an overview of their journey across New Zealand to discover and document the lines.

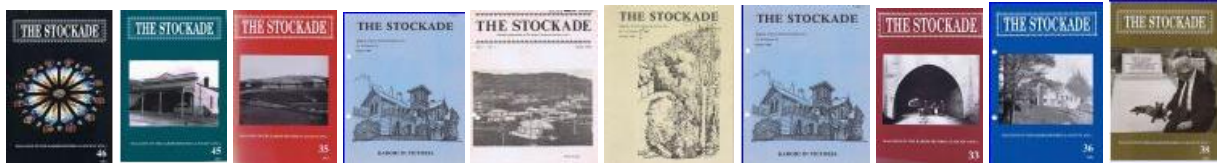


Your Stockade needs you!
