Talk

Please join us to hear Ben Schrader talk about his book *The Big Smoke: New Zealand Cities 1840-1920*.



The pursuit of city life is one of the most important untold stories of New Zealand. *The Big Smoke* is the first comprehensive history to tell this story, presenting a dynamic and highly illustrated account of city life from 1840 to 1920.

It explores such questions as: what did cities look like and how did they change; why were women especially drawn to live in cities; in what ways did Māori experience and shape cities; how far was the street a living room and stage for city life; and why did New Zealand so quickly become a nation of townspeople?

At a time of national debate over housing and the growth of our cities, Ben Schrader's superb new history reveals how our urban origins have shaped the people we are today.

Ben Schrader is a Wellington historian specialising in urban history and historic preservation. He was Senior Researcher of the award-winning *New Zealand Historical Atlas* (1997) and has written extensively for Te Ara, the online encyclopedia of New Zealand, for which he co-edited the City and Economy theme. His last book was *We Call it Home: A History of State Housing in New Zealand* (2005), a finalist in the 2006 Montana Book Awards.

March Speaker

Our speaker in March was Mary McEwen, who told us about her father in law, Jock McEwen, who she described as an administrator, historian, linguist, composer, master carver and a well-known figure in the Maori world and wider Pacific. Mary, who was accompanied by her husband Andrew, Jock's son, outlined Jock's early life in rural Manawatu where he learnt to speak fluent Maori and developed an interest in Maori carving.

This in turn led to his employment in the Native Department, which later became the Department of Maori Affairs. At one stage of his career he was appointed Resident

Commissioner of Niue Island followed by a subsequent appointment to the Permanent Head of Island Territories and Maori Affairs.

After his retirement, Jock gave many years of voluntary service including assisting Maori in community affairs and training many groups in the art of Maori carving.

A very illuminating presentation on a very interesting New Zealander.

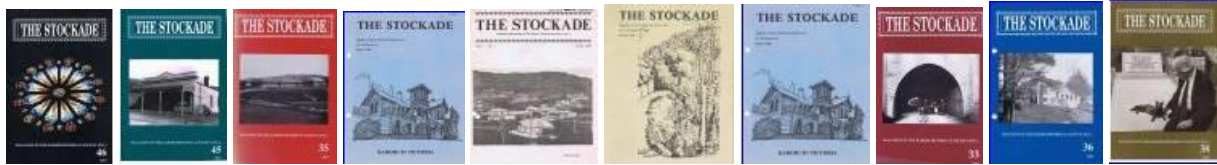
